

Last week ... as recalled by Allen Horrell



After grace was sung, and the Queen toasted, we were saddened to hear that **Faye Dunn** was ill, and that PP **Bob Carroll** has had another stroke last week and is in hospital. On a brighter note President Ken welcomed **Marie Peake**, here to help PP **Ashley** celebrate his 50th Rotary

Anniversary.

The first course was a fluoro green zucchini soup that fortunately tasted much better than it looked. Apparently the chef has decreed that soup shall replace dessert during the colder weather. PP **Peter Cooper** was next up to remind us of the social night at the Ryde-Parramatta Golf club on Friday night.

Community Chair **Nora** appealed for Mothers' Day delivery volunteers, and told us that Hat Day is all planned for next Tuesday, and Red Shield is also fast approaching. Nora thanked Rtn **Maureen Mulheron** for all her help in organising these projects.

Victoria reported that **David Johnston** had taken her on a tour of Channel 10, and she learned that TV production requires lots of people and technology and even more buttons to push. She and a friend went to Manly and ate lunch on the beach, but the rest of the week was spent anticipating Safari: on Sunday she will fly to the Gold Coast and begin a 20 day Coach tour of Australia, a large part of it anyway. The itinerary includes Cairns, the Great Barrier Reef, Alice Springs, Uluru, Victoria Harbour, then Melbourne from whence she shall fly home to Sydney.

Club Historian PP **Doug Thompson** read an account *(see Page 9)* of Ashley Peake's 50-year career in Ryde Rotary, an inspiration to us all: President in 1967/68, and described by legendary past President **Ron Pacey** as "Mr Rotary" for his intimate knowledge of all things Rotary from our By-Laws to the RI Manual of Procedure. President Ken presented Ashley with a second Sapphire Paul Harris Fellow pin, before a letter of congratulations from PP **Eric Bond** was read to the club, to universal applause.

Ashley replied with reminiscences of those 50 years, of which the remarkable conferences at Macquarie University and Canberra were highlights. There have been many changes in those 50 years, but although different today, the club is still doing the same sort of great things as it was back then.

PDG **Les Whitcroft** commented that in the 67 years of the club's existence, 350 people have been inducted into Ryde Rotary. Of all these, only two have reached the status of 50 years of service. PP **Ashley Peake** has now joined this select group.

The second course of marlin steaks and chat potatoes arrived and was consumed by the time Corporal **David James** rose to deputise for the absent Serjeant **Steve**. Some men are born to greatness; others have it thrust upon them when the Serjeant gets a better offer and ropes them in as replacement. The rostered greeters **Geoff Nix** and **John Brown** acted as tax collectors for the acting Serjeant, who announced that since there were no birthdays or anniversaries this week, he was fining everyone in the room without a birthday or anniversary this week! It was a slaughter. He then fined **Bob Kaye-Smith** for smashing Ryde Council's crockery, **Nora** for looking cosy, and perhaps

crossing a line, **Ashley Peake** for his 50 years' Service above Self! He then fined **Siddharth** for his impending deportation and **Ron Taffa** for being on "The Block" sometime soon

Youth Chair **Charles Kilby** thanked the troops for their help on paint vandalism cleanup duties the previous Sunday. Once again the Justice department provided a volunteer to assist in cleaning his own graffiti off Ryde walls. Charles also spruiked the benefits of hosting an exchange student, asking members to consider hosting our inbound student from Finland due in July.

Siddharth introduced Michael Waterhouse to speak on the New Guinea Gold Rush between the wars. Following WWI Australia was granted protectorate status over New Guinea by the League of Nations, which essentially made it Australian territory. Gold was discovered in 1926, only 32 miles from the coast, but in such rugged country that this was a 6 day trek for porters carrying all supplies in on their backs, making the necessities of life very expensive: it cost £1000 to live on the goldfields for six months, meaning that this was "No Poor Man's Field", giving Michael's book its title. Since 90% of the white population had served together in the Great War, there was a core value of mateship which helped make life bearable on the goldfields. Vast amounts of Gold and Silver were extracted from the region, much of it by dredges flown in by Junkers freight planes and assembled on site. In an 11 year period 40,000 tonnes of goods were flown into the New Guinea hinterlands, more than all of Australia's pre-WWII airfreight. This aviation feat continued until both Junkers aircraft were destroyed by Japanese Zeroes in 1942. Michael knew his material well and was passionate about the story he had to tell, and this combination made for a gripping presentation. His cousin John Mazlin thanked him on our behalf, and the applause was genuine before we closed the meeting with our National Anthem.



Macular Degeneration Program



otarians around Australia have partnered with Macular Foundation to carry out a giant public awareness campaign. The last week in May is officially Macular Degeneration Awareness Week and will be promoted as such through all media outlets.

The material to be distributed comprises an Amsler Grid and an information sheet. These will be delivered to your club in the next few weeks and each club will receive 10 per member, ie. a club of 20 will receive 200. The idea is to deliver this material to the relevant demographic groups

within your area. The target group is anyone over age 50.

The obvious groups are Probus, Bowls clubs, Doctor's surgeries, Golf Clubs, Retirement Villages, Chemist counters, and very important, your own members and their extended family.

In doing this task, you have the power to save someone's sight. The earlier treatment is started the better the result. The Amsler Grid is a ten second eye test card which is magnetised to sit on your fridge so that a check can be done at any time.

This project was the initiative of the Rotary Club of Yea, District 9790 after their President-elect lost his sight because he did not have access to the right information.

The setting up, printing and distribution has cost over \$100,000 so we would really appreciate it if you could undertake to make sure that all material is distributed during Macular Awareness Week to coincide with the publicity campaign.

When you start handing these out you will be amazed at how many places you can find to distribute them and the public are extremely grateful to be given such a simple tool to help them maintain their sight.

Tribute to PP Ashley Peake

Exactly fifty years ago next Tuesday night, President Bill Stacey inducted a young Eastwood dentist, Ashley Peake, into the Rotary Club of Ryde. Ashley's desire to involve himself fully in Rotary saw him accept directorships in three different services before the Club appointed him as President for the 1967-68 year.

During his presidential year, Ryde sponsored the Rotary Club of Eastwood, and ran the District Conference at Macquarie University. Such was the great



organisation and diligence of Ryde Rotarians that the success of the Conference brought generous praise from DG Gordon Harman and all District Clubs. Of the many local projects undertaken that year, one stood out. That was the Child Accident Survey, run successfully in conjunction with the Health Department and Ryde Council. Volunteers conducted a survey of accidents to children in the District, and gathered much valuable information. This was publicised widely and created great interest. The main international project, arranged through Community Aid Abroad, provided a water supply and irrigation for the village of Mohanpur, 120 miles from Calcutta. Funds for this were raised from an Art Show.

In the years following, PP Ashley showed continued leadership skills in diverse areas, particularly Programs, Classification and Membership Development. The early eighties saw him appointed as an Unattached Director because his contributions were so highly regarded. The Board in February 1988, recognised him as a Paul Harris Fellow.

Let me use a quotation from our longest-serving Charter Member PP Ron Pacey. Ron wrote "The Rotary Club of Ryde over the years has been blessed with many fine Rotarians, but only two of them ever earned the title of 'Mr Rotary' because of their intimate knowledge of the Ideals of Rotary, and because of their thorough understanding of the Constitution and By-Laws of Rotary International, of the Club Constitution and By-Laws, and of the 'Bible' of Rotary – the Manual of Procedure. The first was Eric Allars and the second Ashley Peake". This quotation sums up PP Ashley's ongoing Ryde Rotary involvement. In June 2001, the Board awarded Ashley a Sapphire Pin.

Those of us who were fortunate enough to attend our Club's 66th Birthday Celebration recently, were privileged to hear PP Ashley propose the toast to our Club. Every word underlined what has been already said. PP Ashley's intimate knowledge of our Club and its history was clearly and definitely expressed. How many of us are aware that those wise words were spoken so ably by a Rotarian in his ninety-second year?

For such long and meritorious service to the Rotary Club of Ryde, our Board wishes to honour PP Ashley Peake with a second Sapphire Pin.
