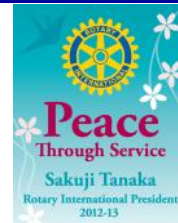

Adrian attempted to return clothing left in the Graffiti trailer on Sunday, but the Serjeant pounced, gloating that he was certain of at least two fines for his later session.

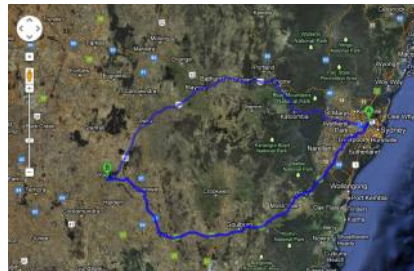

She thanked the 8 workers including two community work "volunteers" supplied by the Justice Department, and singled out PE Adrian Hallett, who organised the project.

She thanked PP Bob Carroll for running the Meals on Wheels, and pointed out that the next fifth Sunday is on 30th of September, and four volunteers are needed.

We need to wrap Father's Day gifts for 120 male residents living in six nursing homes, on Wednesday 22nd of August at 6.00 pm in the City of Ryde Mayor's office and also need volunteers to actually deliver the gifts on Fathers' Day.

City of Ryde Eisteddfod—Saturday 1st September

Every year the Riverside Clubs sponsor the City of Ryde Eisteddfod, which is a non profit and volunteer based organisation. The primary aim is to run competitions for schoolchildren in singing, dancing, acting, playing musical instruments, and public speaking.

The Riverside Clubs sponsor two scholarships known as "Rotary Speech Scholarships".

The competitions are on Saturday 1st September from 2-5.00 pm at Argyle Hall on the corner of Argyle Avenue and Blaxland Road, Top Ryde. The first competition starts at 2.00 pm for the juniors (14 year and under) and the second competition is at 3.30 pm for the seniors (15 years and over). In total 18 students will participate to show their speech abilities.



There will be two places chosen for each group and will be awarded money prizes—the winner will get \$400 and the runner up \$100.

Let us all support these eighteen students by attending the competition.

A few points immediately come to mind —

- With too many members, the social life of a club can become segmented and full of cliques.
- I like being able to recognise, and know something of, everyone in our club.
- To be a member of a club is a privilege.
- Being a member of a Rotary club is about being a member of a community.
- It is about recognition, and being a member of an organisation, which while being bigger than any individual, is fundamentally for and about the individual.
- To be a member of a good club is to be both rewarding and fun.
- This may pose the question, "What is a 'good' club?"
 - It is a place where someone can feel free to be creative in how they go about any task.
- All other things being equal, a member should want to stay with our club a long time.

While writing this I thought to look what others have said, or what Rotary itself says. I rather liked:

- It is about meeting needs —
 - In an increasingly complex world, Rotary provides one of our basic needs: the need for friendship. It is one of the two reasons Rotary was founded in 1905.
- It is about education.
 - Each week at Rotary there is a program designed to keep members informed about community, national and world events. Guest speakers and timely topics are presented and discussed.

If you are able to relate to some or all of these comments and observations, then maybe they are some of the things to discuss when considering someone for membership.

I realise we spent a lot of time recently being terrorised by Rob Mitchell to sort out some ideas and ideals for the club that may be reflected above. My apologies Rob, but if you read yourself in here, I am not intentionally plagiarising you or anyone else!

In talking to other members over the past few weeks, one question comes to the fore all the time. How large should our club be? My current answer is —

- It should be large enough to enable us to handle projects of significance.
- It should be large enough to 'hide' in.
- It should not be so large that a member can feel lost.
- It should be small enough so that a member can be noticed.

My aim as Membership Director? To ensure that at the end of this Rotary year, at worst our membership remains constant, and at best to have two or three new long-term members.

Helping save kids' lives in northern Rwanda

I just returned home from two years living and working as a physician in rural Rwanda.

Like the other times I have returned home from abroad, I welcome the familiarity of things. I love understanding the subtleties of language and knowing how to greet someone without seeming awkward. I like the hot showers and my spring mattress and the coffee shop on the corner.

But, inevitably I miss what has become my home away from home. This time, I miss the hospital on the terraced green hill-top in northern Rwanda.

As any returning exchange student can attest, the most common question you are asked upon returning home is: "How was it?" I struggle to come up with a few words or a phrase to sum up my last two years in Rwanda.

It was amazing and challenging and inspiring and tragic and beautiful and frustrating all at the same time. I want to tell you about the thousands of hills in northern Rwanda and the green and blue and purple hues that light them at sunset and the gorillas that play in their forests.

I want to tell you about the children who must never have been told that the yellow jerrycans of water they carry home every day are heavy because they lift them with such ease. I want to tell you about the women in their bright clothes balancing rainbow coloured umbrellas and baskets of pineapples piled high upon their head all while climbing up and down impossibly steep mountain trails.

I also want to tell you about my patients. I want to tell you about the infants who would have died if that hospital was not there. They are now learning to coo and babble and crawl and toddle. I want to tell you about Alice and Axel and all of the other children who died despite our best efforts. They remind us to try harder. I want to tell you about the sorrow on a father's face when he hears that there is nothing we can do for his son except control his pain as he dies. I want to tell you about the doctors and nurses I worked with who keep trying and keep learning in spite of these tragedies in hopes of saving more lives.

Instead, while those images and emotions and memories wash over me like a tidal wave, I tell you, "It was great." And it was.

Note: Alexandra Vinograd returned to the United States in June, after working for two years at a hospital in Rwanda, helping to treat children in life-threatening situations. The only paediatric specialist serving an area of 400,000 people, she accompanied doctors to teach other doctors and nurses to improve the quality of care provided.

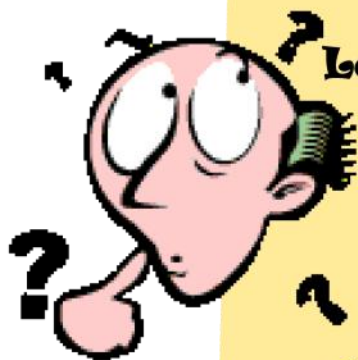

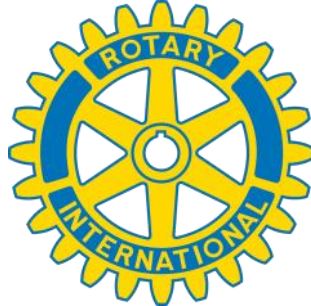
