

Rob said it was a flat structure with RI President, DGs, and Clubs, which of course ignores what he later called its "large infrastructure" with hierarchies at RI World, Zone and District levels



"What is a member?" Rob asked. "We don't have members, we have Rotarians!" I replied. "That is a pedantic New Zealander!" yelled another even more pedantic New Zealander.

"We are talking in circles!" cried PP Duncan some time later, but Rob proved him wrong with his next slide, clearly displaying a rectangle of stakeholders. "We are both the workers and the owners of Rotary," concluded trainer Rob. "No, we are not!" interjected DG John, and went on to develop an alternative interpretation at some length, which I won't try to reproduce here. Moving on from this sustained attack on his training material, Rob discussed Service Projects, and I think we can all agree that good projects contribute much to making a good Rotary club, generating good public relations, involvement, fellowship and satisfaction for our members.

PP Ken Allen says it is about engagement and connection. In any organisation (Church or Rotary) people will stay if they are given something worthwhile to do, and form relationships with other members. A Rotary Club then has elements of both a business and an extended family, or at least that is how it seems to me in Ryde Rotary. Thanks, Rob for taking on the training session, it provoked a lot of thought among your audience. After the Anthem, a Board meeting inspired by this example approved sending more of our Rotarians to the Rotary Leadership Institute at Thornleigh.

Weekly Report — Membership

This is the second report for my year for The Hub.

In my last report, I let my mind wander over the idea of membership in a rotary club.

This time I go in a different direction. Firstly, what has been the year to date with respect to membership.

We have inducted two new members, Katherine Dodd and Rob Senior. I have one person actively engaged in exploring being a member, but he has yet to be able to attend a meeting. I hope to be able to introduce him to you soon. I am also aware of at least two others being 'cultivated'. One critical point to make here: we need to manage the number of potential members we have in the 'pipe-line'. We certainly do not need a flood of potential members.

Last meeting two people spoke about 'membership', Rob Mitchell formally, and John Dodd raised issues, to which Tony Jones (Q&A) might say, "I'll take that as a comment". Rob started to speak about 'members' then morphed between that and 'membership'. No doubt what each said added value to the conversations we are having around 'membership', with points I shall comment on from my perspective as membership director.

Rob asked what it is to be a member of a rotary club. This is important for if we cannot communicate critically why we are a member – and I felt those that did speak in answer to Rob's question were having some difficulty fully clarifying this for themselves - how can we explain it coherently to a prospective member?

John, made two observations I picked up on. First, that we should focus on targeting specific vocations, the second describing the type of person we should look for. Each of these comments made me think further about how this could all be managed. This though still begs the question about how we actually go about finding and attracting these sort of people.

During the board meeting that followed, the idea that we could have a club session where members might explore how they might develop a relationship with a prospective member, that hopefully ends up with that person joining the club. Perhaps this could be included as part of Rob's initiative that he started this evening. I'll have to speak with him on this.

During my time in rotary there have been many such sessions as this evening's, from which have developed a number of initiatives. Yet, we still find ourselves covering the same ground. This leaves me with a question or two:

- Why do we have trouble finding people who wish to join and stay?
- What is it that we are looking for? John's second point went a long way in answering this.

I am interested in asking members to answer, in writing and anonymously, two questions:

- Why did you become a member?
- Why are you still a member?

In conclusion, would any member who is having a conversation with a potential prospective member please inform me. This will assist me to keep some hold on this process.

• This task is the responsibility of each member. Maybe some form of recognition to a successful sponsor of a new member?

Enough for the moment, and thank you for your patience.

VALE— Val and Reg Style

embers of several local Rotary clubs were saddened to learn last week of the passing of two valued former Rotarians - Val and Reg Style.

Members of Ryde and other Rotary clubs attended their funeral on Thursday 25th October at Forest Lawn Memorial Park, Leppington.

Val joined the Rotary Club of Rydalmere in 1992 where she remained an active member until she retired due to ill health in 2003. She served as President in 1997, instigating new projects including the Probus Club of Dundas Valley.

Past District Governor Les Whitcroft who contributed one of the obituaries at the funeral, met Val when he became manager at National Can in 1966. Recognising her special talents, he soon appointed her as his secretary where she excelled in promoting a happy relationship between customers, employees and management. She subsequently worked at 'Rotary Down Under' and was also active in the Secretaries' Association introducing state wide 'Job Skill' events to students and opening opportunities for employment.

Reg was proud of his military service, having done National Service in 1955. He then joined the Citizen Military Forces until he enlisted in the Australian Regular Army in 1958. He served for 21 years including twelve months in Vietnam. He was active in Legacy, frequently taking busloads of war widows on excursions.

Val was admitted to a nursing home in 2005, and as Reg's health was also declining, in 2010 members of the Rotary Club of Ryde assisted in clearing out a portion of their family home prior to sale.

Reg and Val were both residents at the Frank Whiddon Masonic Nursing Home, Glenfield. Val passed away on 17th October, followed by Reg only four days later. They will be remembered as staunch Rotarians, always ready to help, with a smile for everyone they met.
