

Bill Payne spoke on Bowel Care – it is the second most common cancer in Australia, and the easiest cured with early detection. "The Board passed a motion supporting this project!" he said. "It's not just a program, it's a movement!" interjected PP Geoff Brennan. I wondered – did Bowel Care feature in our District magazine "Humanity in Motion?

Serjeant Duncan had guest Hilal Varinli draw Graham Metcalfe's ticket, and he duly chose a bottle of white. Strangely, the usual fine for those with birthdays was replaced with a lucrative fine of those who did not have a birthday this week. As the spackle and the Serjeant's fines go to fund the meals for our guests, we all paid up cheerfully – it is for a good cause. In the cross-fines Geoff Brennan fined Kalma McLellan for describing him as "Imperious" in the Hub. "The correct term is 'arrogant' or 'bombastic'!" he proclaimed grandiloguently.

Siddarth Maheshwari fined the Serjeant for his unusually broad birthday fine in the week of the Serjeant's own birthday, a case of adding two and two to get eight: the timing was purely coincidental, of course!

David James acknowledged Ron Thomson's sterling efforts in raising \$20,000 through the Golf Day for the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA), as part of his introduction of Cassandra Birch and Tony Sonneveld from the PCFA.

Tony spoke on his experience with prostate cancer, pointing out that there are 120,000 Australians living with the condition today. Last year we had the lowest ever numbers of deaths from breast cancer in our history, so research and

scan programs do work. Tony suggested we could do the same with prostate cancer.

The PCFA was originally formed as a Rotary project by Lane Cove Rotary, and Lindsay May was a director for several years, and the Constitution requires that the Board include at least one Rotarian, so this organisation is part of the Rotary 'Family'. Tony's cancer is now in his bones but he says he still feels pretty well, but joked that the female hormone treatments have some unusual side effects.

At this point **John Mazlin** advanced his theory that sugar causes cancer, and asked whether a sugar-free, alkaline body PH would protect against cancer. Tony answered the question at some length, but the short answer is no. **Geoff Nix** then asked "What age should you be PSA tested?" Tony replied "50; 40 if you have a family history." He pointed out that the PSA test is free under Medicare, and usually included with your annual check-up blood tests for cholesterol, sugar and liver function.

Our guest **Virinli Hilal** spoke on the sugar effect, saying that of course cancer cells grow faster in a sugar solution than in water, but that this does not mean people should starve themselves of sugar to avoid cancer. "That is a very dangerous idea, while excess sugar is bad, sufficient sugar is essential for health"

Tony Sonneveld closed with the news that there is a new cancer treatment drug that is now approved for use, but not yet government funded. The PCFA is advocating that it be funded: "We hope that we can get it up!" he said, and closed his talk on prostate cancer on that ambiguous note.

Ron Thomson thanked Tony and Cassandra and said the Prostate Cancer Foundation was a popular cause as beneficiary of our Golf Day. Cheques for \$20,000 were presented and Cassandra in turn thanked us all.

I would have liked to talk longer with Tony after the meeting, but the Board meeting was on and duty called.

Polio Progress

T

his morning [25 April 2013], financial commitments totaling approximately **US\$4 billion** over six years toward the **US\$5.5 billion endgame strategy** of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative were announced during the Global Vaccine Summit in Abu Dhabi.

Rotary was represented at the meeting by India National PolioPlus Chair Deepak Kapur, International PolioPlus Committee Chair Bob Scott, PolioPlus Director Carol Pandak, and the entire 2-day event was emceed by Rotary polio ambassador, actress Archie Panjabi.

A <u>comprehensive six-year plan</u>, the first plan to eradicate all types of polio disease – both wild poliovirus and vaccine-derived cases – simultaneously. Global leaders and individual philanthropists signaled their confidence in the plan by pledging close to three-quarters of the plan's projected US\$5.5 billion cost over six years. They also called upon additional donors to commit up front the additional US\$1.5 billion needed to ensure eradication.

The Crown Prince of Abu Dhabi also announced a second pledge to polio eradication of US\$120 million, adding to his first contribution made in 2011. A range of other donors, including the Islamic Development Bank, Ireland and Japan, helped round out the additional new pledges.

The new plan capitalizes on the best opportunity to eradicate polio, with the number of children paralysed by this disease at the lowest level ever: just 223 cases in 2012 and only 19 so far this year. The urgency is linked to the tremendous advances made in 2012 and the narrow window of opportunity to seize on that progress and stop all poliovirus transmission before polio-free countries become re-infected.

"After millennia battling polio, this plan puts us within sight of the endgame. We have new knowledge about the polioviruses, new technologies and new tactics to reach the most vulnerable communities. The extensive experience, infrastructure and knowledge gained from ending polio can help us reach all children and all communities with essential health services," said World Health Organization Director-General Margaret Chan.

National Immunization Day

roducers Stuart Cleland and Kate Benzschawel, and photographer Alyce Henson, members of RI's Broadcast Media Department, are spending 18 days in Africa documenting Rotary projects. The first half of their journey is in Côte d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast), which held National Immunization Days beginning 26 April. The nation's last case of polio occurred in July 2011. Cleland filed this post.

Monday 22 April, was our first full day in Abidjan. The main part of it was a visit to the offices of the World Health Organization

or, as it's called here in French-speaking Côte d'Ivoire, Organisation mondiale de la Santé (OMS).

There we interviewed the top man, Dr. Allaranger Yokouide. He spoke glowingly of his organization's partnership with the partners, saying that the bond among WHO, RI, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), and the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is so close that "we speak as one." He emphasized that for polio eradication to become a reality, three interest groups – "the population, especially families; the government; and the GPEI partners" – must work toward the same goal.

On Tuesday we saw two examples of how those groups do indeed work together. In the morning we visited the Institut Nationale d'Hygiène Publique, in Côte d'Ivoire the second link in the famous "cold chain." It's a government facility where the polio vaccine — shipped from Mumbai, India — rests in super-cold freezers prior to being delivered to satellite depots throughout the country. In the hours before the National Immunization Day, the vaccine makes its final journey, to the neighborhood booths where city kids are dosed, and to the portable coolers of volunteers who visit isolated or hard-to-reach communities and homes.

Later in the day, Rotarians and other supporters gathered at an outdoor media event where Marie-Irène Richmond Ahoua, President of the Commission Nationale PolioPlus and member of the Rotary Club of Abidjan-Biétry, proudly handed over Rotary-funded motorcycles, bicycles, shirts, hats and flyers to Minister of Health Dr. Raymonde Goudou Coffie. The minister donned a PolioPlus cap and applauded Rotary for supplying both the ways to publicize the immunization day and the means by which the vaccine will reach – and protect – the children of her country.
