

'm writing this article at home on Australia Day, the local celebrations having been cancelled due to rain. This morning Rose Rocca rang to congratulate us on our first Anniversary as Australian citizens, and I'm writing this wearing an Australia Flag tee-shirt and the Oz Flag thongs I was

given this time last year. I filled my car at the servo this morning and was given a complementary car flag by the Vietnamese Australian attendant.

"Did you catch the academic study "proving" that Australians who mount Aussie flags on their cars are Racists?" I asked.

"That's a lot of rubbish, mate, we're just proud to be Aussies!"

But back to the meeting which began with a long list of apologies, as well as several noshows. He also thanked PP **David James** for the weekly Hub, which is another deadline-driven weekly task.

PP **Rob Mitchell** reported on the fundraising committee's efforts to establish a Top Ryde weekend Market with Ryde Council. This Market will start out small but hopefully build into something big. He also reported that the Borjegai School has been so successful that it has created a groundswell of support for education in the surrounding area. Indigo has several half built schools in neighbouring villages that need to be completed.

President **Ken** circulated a Survey asking whether we should keep or remove various traditions in our club. Ken is not pushing this agenda – DG **David Rands** wants all Presidents to carry out the survey so they have hard data on what their members want, rather than a personal opinion. We voted on whether to discard or retain the Flags and Portrait of the Queen, Loyal Toast, Rotary Grace, National Anthem, Serjeants session, Banners and Honour Boards

A discussion of the value or otherwise of the clubs traditions followed with various views expressed in an atmosphere of mutual respect. **Maureen** made a plea for retention of the flag, and **Siddharth** said we must not appear to new members as if we are frozen in time, and asked us to consider changing with the times to attract younger members. PP Duncan Taylor supported getting rid of the top table, even though that wasn't on the list. I think most of us could see the value of all members' views. The only one I voted to remove is the honour boards: they are heavy, expensive to buy and to maintain, take up

Fortunately the venue, the company and the ever cheerful Rayne still make Tuesday night at Next Generations a good deal.



Meeting Relevance Survey — 2012

District Governor David Rands has encouraged clubs to ascertain members' attitudes towards changes to meeting procedures, displays, wording and protocol. In response, President Ken Allen produced a survey which was completed anonymously at last week's meeting. Those who were absent received an on-line survey, also completed anonymously. Forty-one responses were received; the results are graphed below.

Last weeks' results were in favour of keeping the status quo, but it is worthwhile repeating this annually, and examining trends in responses.



The survey engendered informal discussion about how current procedures appear to potential new members, especially those from different backgrounds. Many of these may never have previously attended a Rotary meeting and may find the things which we take for granted seem unusual.

If you are happy – or unhappy – with the survey results, please provide your comments to the Board. In considering our attitude to change, we should all consider the 4-Way Test and this Rotary year's motto — "Reach Within to Embrace Humanity."

Rotary clubs worldwide meet US\$200 million fundraising challenge

R otary International has succeeded in meeting the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's US\$200 million match in funding for polio eradication, raising more than \$202.6 million as of 17 January.

"We'll celebrate this milestone, but it doesn't mean that we'll stop raising money or spreading the word about polio eradication," Rotary Foundation Trustee John F. Germ told Rotary leaders at the International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA. "We can't stop until our entire world is certified as polio-free.

The fundraising milestone was reached in response to \$355 million in challenge grants awarded to The Rotary Foundation by the Gates Foundation. All funds have been earmarked to support polio immunization activities in affected countries where the vaccine-preventable disease continues to paralyse children.

"In recognition of Rotary's great work, and to inspire Rotarians in the future, the [Gates] foundation is committing an additional \$50 million to extend our partnership," said Jeff Raikes, chief executive officer of the Gates Foundation. "Rotary started the global fight against polio, and continues to set the tone for private fundraising, grassroots engagement, and maintaining polio at the top of the agenda with key policymakers." Raikes also addressed Rotary leaders at the International Assembly.

The new \$50 million grant from the Gates Foundation is not a challenge grant.

Since 1988, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99 percent, from about 350,000 cases annually to fewer than 650 cases reported so far for 2011. The wild poliovirus is now endemic in only four countries: Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, and Pakistan. However, India on 13 January marked a full calendar year without a case, paving the way for its removal from the endemic list.

But other countries also remain at risk for polio cases imported from the endemic countries. In Africa in 2011, Chad and the Democratic Republic of the Congo had significant outbreaks. Also in 2011, a small cluster of polio cases in China, which had been polio-free for a decade, was traced to Pakistan.

Rotary club members not only reached into their own pockets to support the Gates challenge, but also engaged their communities in a variety of creative fundraising projects, such as a fashion show in California that raised \$52,000, benefit film screenings in New Zealand and Australia that netted \$54,000, and a pledge-supported hike through Kilimanjaro, Tanzania, that brought in \$38,000. Many events were planned around 24 October, widely observed as World Polio Day.

To date, Rotarians worldwide have contributed more than \$1 billion toward the eradication of polio, a cause Rotary took on in 1985. In 1988, the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centres for Disease Control and Prevention joined Rotary as spearheading partners of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. More recently, the Gates Foundation has become a major supporter. In 2007, the Gates Foundation gave Rotary a \$100 million challenge grant for polio eradication, increasing it to \$355 million in 2009. Rotary agreed to raise \$200 million in matching funds by 30 June 2012.



Reaching children with the oral polio vaccine in the disease's remaining strongholds is labour- and resource-intensive due to a host of challenges, including poor infrastructure, geographical isolation, armed conflict, and cultural misunderstanding about the eradication campaign.
